AKA SERVICE DAY

MLK We Are One Day of Service aids seniors, community and youth

Beta Delta Omega participated in the MLK Intergenerational "We Are One" Service Day held from 1-3 p.m. Monday, Jan. 16, at City Plaza, 2460 Terry Road in Jackson. More than 9,300 items were collected for those in need.


The event was a remarkable success and open to the community. It was held in partnership with the Metro Jackson Pan-Hellenic Council, the JSD (Dr. Juanita Sims Doty) Foundation, the Erik Dampier Foundation and the Jack and Jill of America – Jackson, Mississippi chapter.

On this Day of Service, meant to honor and celebrate the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., more than 400 individuals, including at least 33 BDO members, participated by collecting, sorting and/or delivering critically needed items to Stewpot Community Services, Billy Brumfield Men's Shelter, Matt's House Shelter for Women and Children, and various senior living facilities in Jackson.

Items collected included 1,810 warm coats, gloves, hats, socks, scarves, blankets, throws, and men's thermal underwear; 323 toiletry items such as shampoo, conditioner, hand sanitizer, combs, Lysol wipes, toothbrushes, and toothpaste; 3,050 paper goods such as toilet tissue, paper towels, paper plates, paper cups, knives, forks, and garbage bags; and 4,150 canned goods and numerous additional food items.

The Intergenerational Community Day of Service was designed to support seniors, serve others and mentor youth. MLK Day of Service is an Area of Focus under Soaring to Greater Heights of Service & Sisterhood initiative in which all members join together to volunteer and serve the community side-by-side.
































YOUTH LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

Beta Delta Omega, in collaboration with Gamma Omicron and Gamma Rho chapters, has hosted three sessions of the sorority's Youth Leadership Institute Program. The first session was held Oct. 23, 2022, with 13 youths ages 11-13 who became actively involved in the inaugural meet and greet/orientation gathering. The students quickly bonded and jumped right in to discover their leadership styles and choose their program activities.

With lots of collaboration, students led subsequent sessions while creating vision boards and conducting personality quizzes. In the third session, students were challenged and their critical thinking skills were put to the ultimate test. Using the theme "Imagining the Future and Its Possibilities," participants visited a local escape room where they executed team building, goal-setting, and problem-solving proficiencies. Using clues, the youth escaped successfully and were rewarded with certificates to celebrate the mid-year progress. YLI, a youth-led and highly interactive leadership development program designed to empower and engage youth, is an Area of Focus under the International Program's Empower Our Families Initiative.

YLI students eagerly displayed their leadership in service by assisting during the MLK Day of Service event. What a wonderful way to spend the MLK holiday by giving back to others!











Enhance Our Environment Committee activities include planting tulips, recycling, and providing energy savings tips

The Enhance Our Environment Committee and CAP, Inc.'s Beautification Committee met on Sunday, Jan. 22, 2023, to plant tulips at the Beta Delta Omega Center. The Enhance Our Environment Committee's focus under the Soaring to Greater Heights of Service and Sisterhood administration is to promote and share knowledge about the community and home gardening, planting trees, waste reduction, and recycling that



will help sorors and communities understand how to improve their environmental stewardship and reduce their environmental footprint.

The Enhance Our Environment Committee's purpose for supporting tulip planting was not just for their beauty but also for their ability to connect sorors to the Earth. As humans, we have a significant impact on the Earth. Gardeners, in particular, are individuals

who are more aware of their impact on the Earth and who also think about ways they can give to the Earth and not take from it so we have an environment to sustain us into the future.

The benefits of planting flowers:

- •Flowers protect the environment by helping to create fresh air by absorbing carbon dioxide from the air.
- •Flowers promote natural aeration of the soil and help reduce erosion and flooding by holding soil in its place.
- •Flowers provide nutrients to the surrounding soil.
- •Flowers provide natural pollination, which keeps the

ecosystem thriving.

- •Flowers provide food and shelter for insects.
- •Flowering plants sustain so many organisms, including humans.
- •Flowers add beauty!

The committee's mission is to promote and participate in efforts to help engage individuals and communities in eco-friendly practices to reduce waste, recycle and protect the environment. Protecting the environment is much more than recycling and picking up litter.

Conservation is a huge component of protecting theenvironment, including water conservation, utility reduction. and being mindful of purchasing non-degradable packaging items. The committee's goal is to bring awareness to personal stewardship so we all can do our part in protecting the environment and reducing the burdens on landfills and the natural environment.



The Enhance Our Environment Committee

sowed sisterly seeds by giving away tulips and daffodils at the chapter meeting on Jan. 21, 2023. Keep Mississippi Beautiful donated the tulips to help in the joint effort to improve communities by preventing litter and promoting recycling and beautification.

To reduce the chapter's carbon footprint, bring awareness, and encourage recycling, the committee implemented a bottle recycling station and helped a Soror recycle by taking the plastic bottles she collected for recycling to a local plastic bottle drop-off center. With the growing water crisis in Jackson, Mississippi, people are bringing thousands of water bottles to the Metro Jackson area. The committee plans to provide chapter members and the community with more information on the location of bottle recycling drop-off centers. Plastic bottles take 450 to 1,000 years to decompose and contribute to a large amount of waste in landfills.



The committee is also committed to providing monthly environmental tips.

For January, Sorors were offered energy savings tips via a QR code that allowed them to register for a free energy savings box, retailed for \$60, from Entergy. Reducing energy usage reduces fossil fuel demand and lowers the atmosphere's carbon dioxide. Increased efficiency can lower greenhouse gas emissions and other pollutants, decrease water pollution, conserve natural resources, and create a healthier environment for communities.

These things we ask in Jesus name. Amen.


TIME TO PRAY

Leadership Development Committee hosts Becoming...Let Go and Grow Session



This journey started during the Leadership AKAdemy sponsored by the Basilei Council in October 2022 with the second session held in November 2022. The third session was led by Leadership Development Chairman, Soror Juanita Sims Doty and it commenced with Basileus Soror Sharron Williams bringing greetings and offering her thoughts on growth and change.

Co-Chairman Soror Tonya Parker also welcomed all sorors and shared brief thoughts on dealing with disappointments and moving forward.
